

# COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

Quite some while ago I joined the Seething group of Community Speed Watch. It was an easy decision to make as I had long been concerned about vehicles travelling too fast through our village. My concerns were for everyone, young children being walked into school by family members, runners, walkers, cyclists, horse riders, dog walkers, children playing on (usually)quiet lanes.

The Volunteers were invited to a training session which was useful and well worth the effort of attending where we were shown how and when to use the speed measuring device and we were issued with our 'Uniform' which consisted of a Hi-Viz vest. Some days later we were out at specific locations around the village which were deemed to be safe locations.

In the early days there were often relatively large numbers of 'Speeders' recorded but as the weeks went by the numbers recorded clearly decreased. We received positive feedback from Norfolk Constabulary on a job being done well and this was very encouraging. A lot of drivers have modified their driving through the village now which is a brilliant effect that our work has caused. We have made a significant difference. Of course we are only active for an hour at a time, completing a session or two each week and excessive speed still occurs. This is reflected in the disappointing numbers of dead animals and birds flattened within the village and the approaches. The sessions that we do usually last for an hour sometimes they can be a little dull but this gives time for chat and helps us get to know each other.

The reactions from drivers vary there are far more waves and smiles than there are unwelcome hand gestures!

# SEETHING PARISH COUNCIL

Whilst enjoying the fourth heatwave of the summer, the warmest North Sea temperatures on record, and the driest spring in over 100years, I'm sure that you share a nagging concern that a hosepipe ban is likely, and that our climate is not behaving as it once did.....

Seething Parish Council recognise that rapid progress toward net-zero is essential to address the climate emergency driving our barmy weather, and this will require renewable energy to replace fossil fuel use. Consequently, this necessitated a carefully considered response to the large-scale East Pye solar scheme phase 2 consultation, to which we were invited to respond as a statutory body (as indeed were all Seething householders): many of you will have attended the information event at the village hall. It seems likely that large scale solar in East Anglia is an inevitability, and although the establishment of "solar fields" tends to create an instinctive negative response; it should be recognised that correctly managed, their impact upon biodiversity and ecology is favourable. Nevertheless, Seething Parish Council recognise that East Pye would represent an enormous change to our South Norfolk countryside.

Our unanimous view remains that constructive engagement with the developer, rather than outright objection, is the approach most likely to minimise the adverse impact of solar PV, and we have again responded stating that changes need to be made to support the scheme. These would include: avoidance of panels in excess of 2.5m height at the boundaries of the sites and their being set back from areas adjacent to housing and rights of way; protection of existing uncultivated grassland, trees, hedgerows and watercourses; management of the sites as wildflower meadow and grazing; protection of wildlife corridors; protection of existing and historic rights of way; guarantees of reversion to agricultural land at the end of scheme; avoidance of any compulsory purchase of land and that the scheme should promote local employment opportunity. Furthermore, we have expressed our concern regarding the suitability of Harvey Lane for increased HGV traffic, and that the risk of WW2 ordnance from Seething Airfield is inadequately addressed.

The formal application to the Planning Inspectorate is expected in late 2025 and we again shall be consulted. A key point that we will again stress is the necessity to consider the environmental impacts of the scheme in the context of other East Anglian solar PV schemes, rather than considering East Pye in isolation.

With the support of the Wilding Seething Group, the Parish Council have endeavoured to provide more information for the community about our local wildlife areas, ponds and meres: you may have noticed the signs that were installed at each of the sites earlier this summer. Our work on pond restoration in Seething has not gone unrecognised and the Council and Wilding Seething have been nominated for the Richard Waddingham Ponds Award

# BLAST FROM THE PAST

1925 records show Seething had a Blacksmith, thatcher, basket maker, wheelwright, 2 poultry dealers, vermin destroyer, market gardener, a children's home and several farmers also a school, pub, and church.

In the early 1900's Godfrey's had the Post Office 1912 then first member of the Freestone family to be Post Master and cycle agent was Harry Freestone a post card has a Seething date stamp of 1913. After his death in 1918 his brother John William Freestone who had been away serving in the 'Norfolk's' during WWI took over then later ran the General Stores with the help of his sister Mrs Ada Vincent whose home on airfield was knocked down during WWII and moved with husband Ted two daughters May and Nancy to live in the Shop & Post Office. This was situated across the road from the current shop today and that is now a private house but then it had a large warehouse and several other buildings that housed beside the Post Office and Grocery Store they had a large range of hardware, household items, clothing, meal and other animal feed, bicycles, nails, paraffin, and petrol. When I left school at 15 in 1949 I started work there we still had rationing so you had to register with a provider, rationing didn't end till July 1954. Sugar came in large sacks, this had to be weighed into blue paper bags, cheese came in a large round block that had to be skinned and cut with a cheese wire, also margarine, butter, lard and cooking fat that came in blocks that also needed cutting to whatever the family rations were, bacon sliced, currants came in large wooden boxes these needed to also be weighed. Biscuits were in large tins so many items came in bulk and had to be dealt with. A large 'round' of orders were delivered around many local villages and the village ones usually on a trade bike. Add to this as most homes had no phone only a village phone box so many telegrams had to be delivered I took some as far away as Thurton, many to a Arab stud farm in Mill road Berghampton some used to have a paid for reply with a stated number of words and it was hard when anyone wanted to add more as this was not allowed! Often another telegram would be waiting to go when you got back we all used the old trade bike. Paraffin and petrol were in demand so with serving in shop and post office, preparing orders everyone was kept very busy.

After J.W. Freestone died in 1955 his son Fred became Post Master and received a Long Term Service Award for 40 years in 1995. I was married in March 1957 and left just before the new shop was finished to have our first son Glenn.

The first purpose built shop and post office built by W. Waters was opened on May 2<sup>nd</sup> 1959 across the road from the old one. In those days wholesalers were all trying to get their custom pre supermarkets. They were a Mace store in 1973 with leaflets issued showing 'Double Cut Price' Maxwell House Coffee, granules or powder 8 oz. 57p, in 1959 a bottle of Camp coffee was 2 shillings 6 and ½ pence pre decimalisation in Feb 1971. They also used to hire out T V sets and Keith's dad Jim Turner used to do the repairs in 1993 Keith started work in the shop and after Fred's death in January 1996 he became Sub Postmaster keeping it in the family his grandmother was Ada Vincent nee Freestone.

We are so very lucky to still have the Post Office and General Stores in our village and have Keith who is such an asset and does such a great job as sub postmaster helping out with info and keeping it open for Seething and other villages, plus the shop with fresh milk and bread and a great range of products not easy now.

## SOUTH NORFOLK MP: BEN GOLDSBOROUGH

Hello everyone,

One local issue I know matters to so many of us is rural road safety. That's why I'm launching a review of South Norfolk's highways and byways to find and fix the places that put people at risk. Villages like Seething and Mundham are too often used as cut-throughs from the A146 to the B1132. I've seen drivers racing round blind bends, only to slam the brakes when they meet a cyclist, walker or tractor. It shouldn't take a collision – or even worse, a fatality – before changes are made. I believe that approach is wrong. We should be preventing crashes before they happen. But I need your help. I want to hear directly from you about the problem spots you know. I've launched a short survey (it takes less than 7 minutes) so you can tell me where improvements are most needed:
