

SEETHING PARISH COUNCIL

East Pye Solar Project

Seething Parish Council felt it was important to seek the views of parishioners on this highly significant development before responding, and in November we distributed a questionnaire and information sheet to all 165 local residents. This followed the presentation meeting by the company at the Village Hall on 8th November.

The questionnaire offered four alternatives: support the proposal, require changes to support the proposal, reject the proposal, require more information. The returns were low in numbers (only 36) but showed a roughly equal response to the four options. 31%, 22%, 22%, 25% respectively. While the modest response seems to indicate some apathy it might also be seen as a lack of the hostility that some authorities are assuming is the case.

In any event Seething PC have submitted a response to the project which broadly fits the 'require changes to support' category. Crucially we recognise that regional and national actions are urgently required to end our reliance on fossil fuels and become more energy independent, as well as address the climate emergency. Following from that, ground mounted solar PV is a necessary part of that strategy being relatively low cost and quick to install. However, in order to be acceptable to local populations, such schemes must be appropriately developed and managed to minimise environmental impact. It is the view of Seething PC that by accepting the necessity for such a scheme, and then lobbying hard to achieve these mitigations, we will benefit more than by simply saying no, as that will probably allow the development to occur unmitigated. Our response includes the following main reservations:

1. Data should be available proving the benefit of the carbon gains (including ongoing through its proposed lifespan) and would justify the loss of agricultural productivity.
2. The visual impact needs to be reduced with a maximum height well below the 4.5m proposed and any fencing should be inside the perimeter with effective natural screening (trees/hedges) outside.
3. Critically, ecological impact on native species must be minimised, wildlife corridors kept open, and biodiversity supported.

WILDING SEETHING

The Wilding Seething Group celebrated its first anniversary in February. We currently number 14 enthusiastic nature-loving volunteers who want to work with, and encourage nature in Seething.

Over the last year, working with Seething PC we have taken over the management of the Church Triangle meadow, producing a fabulous hay crop that is being enjoyed this winter by ponies in the village. Cutting the meadow with a scythe and lifting all cuttings has accentuated the ridge and furrow nature of this heritage meadow. Unfortunately, our attempts to introduce Yellow Rattle (a native annual wildflower that suppresses coarse grass vigour thereby promoting growth of native wildflower species and fine grasses) in the meadow were of rather limited success: we will try again this year with new seed that has been “over-wintered”.

We have cleared goat willow, tidied the hedge and dredged from the Little Mere at the south end of the village which has now been “opened” as an extensive body of water with enormous ecological potential. We have similarly dredged the Church Triangle Pond removing ironwork, carpet alongside large quantities of leaf litter, silt and fallen boughs. The vista from the churchyard gate looking east to the pond is hugely improved. Rather than attempt to re-plant these ponds, (and following NWT advice) we will rely upon existing native seedbeds to repopulate the ponds with native flora and fauna. As we hoped, grass is now shooting through silt and clay that was dredged from the pond and by spring and summer the banks should be much greener.

We will shortly be creating a hibernaculum on the west hedge-side of the meadow with the wood reclaimed from the church pond: this will provide further habitat opportunity for invertebrates, amphibians and small mammals. We are looking forward to another hay crop this year, sequentially cutting the meadow with the intention of encouraging different species of wild flowers throughout the season. The footpath and church car parking areas will be cut, but we would prefer to avoid walking on the growing wildflower areas. Bird nesting will start in March and from then until September, we shall avoid hedge and tree work: please consider this in your own gardens.

Seething is a village of multiple ponds, mature trees, areas of meadow and historical orchard, and these features likely exist in many of the gardens and hedgerows of the village. From an ecological perspective, it is essential that these areas interlink via wildlife corridors and consequently, throughout this year we are keen to create a village-map illustrating these assets.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

With the Anniversary of end of WWII this year I thought some of you might find it of interest to hear a little of what was like in our villages.

I was born in one of the new red council houses down Mill Lane in 1934, we had no electricity water from a well for 8 houses heating and cooking was by coal fire or oil stove and oven in the wall. No bathroom and outside toilet built into house plus another small room with a copper that used coal or wood for washing. Baths in tin bath in front of fire! I started age 5 at Seething School in September 1939 just around the same time as WWII started. Early in the war we had to take our gas masks everywhere and did drills at school, no bomb shelters had to get under your desk in those days you had your own desk where you sat most of the day, no talking! the cane sat on Head teachers desk. We had Lbs and ounces- Pounds, shillings and pence- Times tables and the Alphabet, Dictation, taught to knit, sewing, had P.E. There was an open fire in the main room and a potbellied stove in infants, outside toilets with wooden seats over buckets and cold water to wash your hands. Shortage of paper when you started school you had a small blackboard and chalk plus small shells for sums! We had evacuees from London and a full school in those days. Children were given time off to pick ripe fruit at a Fruit farm due to lack of pickers with so many working away or in forces, we also picked Rose hips to make Rose Hip syrup , picked up acorns for pig feed. We had the 'Nit' Nurse who checked our weight and health Cod liver oil and malt if needed. The windows had black tape over to try to stop injuries from glass during bomb raids. You had blackout, air raids searchlights swept the sky during a raid, guns firing, saw red glow in sky as Norwich burned. Very few people had cars and petrol was rationed we played games on the road! At home no phones- people wrote letters to keep in touch, and telegrams for urgent contacts but it was a big worry if you had someone away in the Forces if you saw them coming down the road., my Father was away in the RAF. Just a battery radio it was used mainly for the news or a wind up gramophone for music records. We helped by getting some fallen boughs or twigs to light the fire, worked in the garden and allotment where Mum was growing vegetables.. Gathered blackberries, had cream off milk in jar or bottle and shook it for ages to make butter. Mum bottled fruit, remember no electricity so meat safe with mesh to keep the flies out, a pail of water in the pantry if you wanted a drink. Milk came straight from the farm to your door and kept in your jugs. We had two shops, a butchers, bread, coal and paraffin was all delivered. There were bus services to Norwich for those who worked or attended high school but you mostly walked or if you were lucky rode a bike to go to work or school. Later in 1943 the Americans arrived at the newly built airfield around 3,000 men and the huge B24 Aircraft , this made a big impact in the local villages, they helped local fund raising concerts at the school and Mundham chapel. They gave parties for local schools, held dances on the base.

In December, we also had a fascinating visit from local wildlife photographer, Harry Read. He shared some amazing stories about the places he has been and animals he has photographed, and he inspired us with his beautiful photographs. The brown bears were a particular highlight.

The beginning of this year has been as fun as always, despite so many children and staff fighting these horrible winter colds and viruses. I have just been out to visit our children in the Forest School area where they braved the rain and wind to make dens, whittle wood, swing on the ropes, dig in the mud and spend time problem solving and socializing with their friends. They were so cheerful – what resilience!
